




## Activity Calendar

	Play Tickle Monster by "chasing" your toddler and catching them with tickles.	Hide a favorite toy or stuffed animal for the child to find.	Make a mask out of a paper plate by drawing a face and cutting out eye holes.	Crumple sheets of old newspaper or junk mail and toss them into the recycling bin.	Feed the birds using old bread or the last bits of cereal.	Have a snack with three different colors of food, such as red, yellow, and green.
Go on a "square hunt" and find items that are square in your home.	Mix up a batch of homemade play clay from flour, oil, salt, and water.	Help the child set the table by pointing out where to place each item.	Sing "Ring Around the Rosie" and fall down on cue.	Drum a simple beat on the table for the child to copy.	Build a bridge with blocks or books. Push small toys or cars across it.	Walk barefoot through the grass and talk about how it feels.
Start the morning by reading a favorite book in bed together.	Mix fish crackers and o-shaped cereal together. Sort before eating.	Make noises like "vroom, vroom" and "beep, beep" while you play with toy cars.	Dress a stuffed animal in a shirt, diaper, and socks.	Make a safe "balance beam" by putting a strip of tape on the floor.	On a sunny day, sing "You Are My Sunshine." Talk about the sun.	Lift up a rock and look underneath. What kinds of creatures live there?
Fill a few water balloons and roll and toss them outside.	Play a game of I Spy while out on a walk.	March in a marching band using wooden spoons and plastic bowls.	Talk about body parts by pointing them out on a favorite doll.	Create a "car wash" for toy cars outside with a bucket, brush, and soapy water.	Pretend to be a frog, squatting and jumping up while saying "ribbit, ribbit."	

NOTE: The suggested activities in this calendar are for family members to do with toddlers ages 18–36 months. Before you begin, make sure the daily activity is appropriate for the age, skill level, and interests of your child.
